t s eliot is not only one of the most important poets of the twentieth century as literary critic and commentator on culture and society his writing continues to be profoundly influential every student of english must engage with his writing to understand the course of modern literature this book provides the perfect introduction to key aspects of eliot s life and work as well as to the wider contexts of modernism in which he wrote john xiros cooper explains how eliot was influenced by the intellectual climate of both twentieth century britain and america and how he became a key cultural figure on both sides of the atlantic the continuing

this wide ranging introduction to the short story tradition in the united states of america traces the genre from its beginnings in the early nineteenth century with irving hawthorne and poe via fitzgerald hemingway and faulkner to o connor and carver the major writers in the genre are covered in depth with a general view of their work and detailed discussion of a number of examples of individual stories the cambridge introduction to the american short story offers a comprehensive and accessible guide to this rich literary tradition it will be invaluable to students and readers looking for critical approaches to the short story and wishing to deepen their understanding of how authors have approached and developed this fascinating and challenging genre further reading suggestions are included to explore the subject in more depth this is an invaluable overview for all students and readers of american fiction

despite its indifferent reception when it was first published in 1851 *moby dick* is now a central work in the american literary canon this introduction offers readings of melville s masterpiece but it also sets out the key themes contexts and critical reception of his entire oeuvre the first chapters cover melville s life and the historical and cultural contexts melville s individual works each receive full attention in the third chapter including *typee* *moby dick* *billy budd* and the short stories elsewhere in the chapter different themes in melville are explained with reference to several works melville s writing process melville as letter writer melville and the past melville and modernity melville s late writings the final chapter analyses melville scholarship from his day to ours kevin j hayes provides comprehensive information about melville s life and works in an accessible and engaging book that will be essential for students beginning to read this important author

the short story has become an increasingly important genre since the mid nineteenth century complementing the cambridge introduction to the american short story this 2007 book examines the development of the short story in britain and other english language literatures it considers issues of form and style alongside and often as part of a broader discussion of publishing history and the cultural contexts in which the short story has flourished and continues to flourish in its structure the book provides a chronological survey of the form usefully grouping writers to show the development of the genre over time starting with dickens and kipling the chapters cover key authors from the past two centuries and up to the present day the focus on form literary history and cultural context together with the highlighting of the greatest short stories and their authors make this a stimulating and informative overview for all students of english literature

as the author of the scarlet letter nathaniel hawthorne has been established as a major writer of the nineteenth century and the most prominent chronicler of new england and its colonial history this introductory book for students coming to hawthorne for the first time outlines his life and writings in a clear and accessible style leland s person also explains some of the significant cultural and social movements that influenced hawthorne s most important writings puritanism transcendentalism and feminism the major works including the scarlet letter the house of the seven gables and the blithedale romance as well as hawthorne s important short stories and non fiction are analysed in detail the book also includes a brief history and survey of hawthorne scholarship with special emphasis on recent studies students of nineteenth century american literature will find this a rewarding and engaging introduction to this remarkable writer

margaret atwood offers an immensely influential voice in contemporary literature her novels have been translated into over 22 languages and are widely studied taught and enjoyed her style is defined by her comic wit and willingness to experiment her work has ranged across several genres from poetry to literary and cultural criticism novels short stories and art this introduction summarizes atwood s canon from her earliest poetry and her first novel the edible woman through the handmaid s tale to the year of the flood covering the full range of her work it guides students through multiple readings of her oeuvre it features chapters on her life and career her literary canadian and feminist contexts and how her work has been received and debated over the course of her career with a guide to further reading and a clear well organised structure this book presents an engaging overview for students and readers

this lively and innovative 2007 introduction to shakespeare promotes active engagement with the plays rather than recycling factual information covering a range of texts it is divided into seven subject based chapters character performance texts language structure sources and history and it does not assume any prior knowledge instead it develops ways of thinking and provides the reader with resources for independent research through the where next sections at the end of each chapter the book draws on up to date scholarship without being overwhelmed by it and unlike other introductory guides to shakespeare it emphasizes that there is space for new and fresh thinking by students and readers even on the most studied and familiar plays

as the author of the mill on the floss and middlemarch george eliot was one of the most admired novelists of the victorian period and she remains a central figure in the literary canon today she was the first woman to take on the kind of political and philosophical fiction that had previously been a male preserve combining rigorous intellectual ideas with a sensitive understanding of human relationships and making her one of the most important writers of the nineteenth century this innovative introduction provides students with the religious political scientific and cultural contexts they need to understand and appreciate her novels stories poetry and critical essays nancy henry also traces the reception of her work to

the present surveying a range of critical and theoretical responses each novel is discussed in a separate section making this the most comprehensive short introduction available to this important author
